
# **Benedictine Monastery Development Enters Construction Phase**

Following a March 2 pre-construction meeting, activity on the new development at 800 N. Country Club is taking off. Our Councilman, Steve Kozachik, has worked with the project manager Sundt has on this job during several UA construction jobs. "She will do a great job being sensitive to the project schedule, budget and the concerns of the surrounding neighbors."

The construction is planned to take about twenty months. There has been no decision made at this point on what the new uses inside the sanctuary will be. Count on something commercial, but until investors see that zoning entitlements are locked in, they're reluctant to commit to any given project.

The work has begun to build 294 apartments, parking and business spaces at the Benedictine Monastery and will continue for about 18 months.

These seedlings are from the Benedictine site and are now growing in the Mission Gardens green house for preservation.



During the summer there may be as many as 40 concrete pours overnight but trucks will not have their back-up signals sounding. Attention will be paid to dust, and noise control. Work hours will be from sunrise until 8pm, Monday through Saturday. Lights will not be allowed to spill into homes. #### SOME SANCTUARY TREES WILL HAVE A NEW HOME

You may wonder...What will happen to the lovely old trees on the Benedictine Sanctuary's grounds when apartments and parking structures crowd them out? Many years ago the Benedictine Sisters sold their oranges, avocados, and dates to help pay for the bills. After the Sanctuary was sold the newspapers reported that the exotic trees would be dug up, transplanted and moved elsewhere. Then horticultural experts from the University, the Sonoran Desert Museum and many private nurseries got together and made a more practical plan. First of all the SHOCK of transplanting the huge trees might just kill them! Plus it would be very costly. So they created a simpler and less deadly plan. They would take cuttings, seeds, and grafts of the fruit-bearing trees to the Mission Gardens' green house. There they would be nurtured and cared for to maturity. The Mission Gardens located at 946 W. Mission Lane, are an agricultural museum of Sonoran Desert-adapted trees and crops. So...you can drop into the Gardens and visit them sometime! It's a lovely new home for them.

# PLANNING FOR MAJOR STREET PROJECTS IN Miramonte Neighborhood is Underway

# 1. Traffic Circle at Camino Miramonte/Third Street: A Work in Progress

In early 2019, Miramonte neighbors approved a traffic circle at this location as part of the City's efforts to improve safety for those using the Third Street Bike Route. A Miramonte Design Committee formed in August 2019 to work with the City to design a circle unique to Miramonte Neighborhood. As a result, there is the concrete base for a privately funded art project at the site. The Committee just approved the conceptual design (See p. 4).

Planning is now underway to submit for City and Arts Foundation approval a design which is intended to be a long-term asset to the neighborhood. That approval process can take up to three months, so any construction will likely be late 2020/early 2021. Thanks to the unknown neighbors who have added whimsy to the vacant space in the meantime.

An additional feature of this intersection is the squaring of the turn lanes with new curbing, described as an engineering necessity to make traffic circulate properly. Asphalt has been removed from the newly enclosed areas so that rainwater will soak into the soil to support plantings which the City will provide. The City has also promised the restoration of a safe crosswalk on the northwest corner.

# 2. Traffic Circle at Richey/Third Street: An Up-coming Project

In late 2019, the City identified location of a second traffic circle on the Third Street Bike Route, this one at Richey. At a neighborhood meeting on Feb. 27, 2020, Diana Alarcon, head of Tucson Department of Transportation and Mobility, promised that the second circle will have the same base and circumference features as those at Camino Miramonte. The neighborhood will be responsible for the design and finance of the interior public art. A survey monument and a manhole cover will affect the space and design of that circle interior. The Design Committee, members Mike Anglin, Ruth Beeker, Sam Behrend, Kim Fernandez, Eduardo Guerrero and Adam Lucia, will work to ensure that there is aesthetic compatibility of the two Third Street projects.

Neighbors requested that the City provide marked crosswalks at that intersection. On May 27, Ryan Fagan, director of the Bike Project, sent an email stating the City will do a study to see if the amount of car traffic and pedestrian activity warrants their inclusion there.

Construction of the entire Bike Project is due to begin this fall, so Miramonte Neighborhood Association needs to raise funds for the Richey public art now. (See p. 4).
