From the President: Miramonte Park - A Community Asset in Need of Our Care

As many of you know, the City of Tucson, in collaboration with the Miramonte Neighborhood Association, made several upgrades to Miramonte Park in 2022 and 2023. Improvements included new playground equipment, a drinking fountain, and a large sunshade. Other Miramonte residents kindly donated their time and talent to paint the hummingbird mural, recondition the free library boxes, design and post educational bird signage, and host neighborhood gatherings to enhance community engagement and make the park a hub for positive activities.

Despite these improvements, however, we have faced considerable challenges to the park's safety and appeal over the past few

months. Homeless encampments, drug use and paraphernalia, graffiti and vandalism, littering, and unsanitary conditions have become pressing issues.

It's important to point out that anyone is entitled to use the park during the hours it is open, including those who are experiencing homelessness (although camping is prohibited). Of course, activities such as open drug use, threatening behavior, and theft are illegal. If you spot illegal activity at the park – or anywhere in




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Miramonte – please dial 911 for immediate concerns or the City's new 311 non-emergency number. It is important that if you SEE something, SAY something. While it is unfortunate that Tucson Police can't always immediately dispatch an officer to every call they get (and they get plenty), they DO track every incident report. The City and TPD are data driven organizations by necessity; the data they accumulate from call-ins and reports are used to allocate additional patrols and resources to combat problem areas. That means, the more calls/reports they receive from us, the better their response.

Homelessness and drug addiction are tough and complex problems, but while local and national governments are addressing larger issues, we can also foster a sense that the park is our park, a community asset to be used and preserved. Regular use of the park can deter undesirable, illegal activities and promote a safer environment. MNA remains committed to bringing our community together by sponsoring park events. In fact, we look forward to seeing many of you at our annual Halloween party and parade on Saturday, October 26th. Meanwhile, walking your dog, hosting a coffee klatch or small gathering, or meeting up at the park for a bicycle ride or group walk are excellent ways to keep Miramonte Park a welcoming space for everyone.

Traffic Calming on Camino Miramonte

The city has completed installation of five chicanes on Camino Miramonte between 2nd Street and 5th Street, which are designed to slow traffic by narrowing the roadway. The city also painted white striping about five feet from the curb on each side of the street to indicate to drivers that area is used by bicyclists and pedestrians.

The chicanes have already had a positive impact, visibly slowing auto traffic on Camino Miramonte. In addition, attractive neighborhood signage has been installed in the northernmost and southernmost chicanes, thanks to the generous donation of a neighborhood resident.

The final step will be landscaping with native and desert-adapted plants, which is expected to be installed by a city contractor by the end of October. Our thanks to former Councilman Steve Kozachik, who was instrumental in making the project happen.

Recycling Update...or...The Great Orange Bag versus Blue Bin Dilemma

As of July 1, 2024, what's known as "hard to recycle" plastics (those to be deposited in the orange containers at the Ward 6 office and other locations) must be in Hefty® ReNew® orange bags. As of that date, anything added to the bins that is not first bagged in orange is deemed trash and is treated as such by city staff. So, if you are currently placing hard to recycle plastics in the Ward 6 Office orange containers in clear or colored bags — or simply putting stuff in there without it being bagged at all — please stop. Similarly, if you are putting any items other than hard to recycle plastics in those bins, please stop. Too often, it results in legitimate hard to recycle plastics ending up in the landfill rather than being pressed into blocks by ByFusion as intended.

Orange Hefty® ReNew® bags can be purchased at local Walmart, Ace Hardware, Frys, and Bashas locations. They are also available online at Target.com.

Click the QR code at right to download a nifty flyer that you can print and hang on your refrigerator. It lists acceptable orange bag hard to recycle plastics AND acceptable curbside blue bin items on one handy sheet.

Know before you throw:

- No matter what the bin or bag, all items must be empty, clean, and dry.
- Orange Hefty® bags of hard to recycle items cannot go in the curbside blue bins.
- Curbside blue bin recyclables should be tossed loose in the bin, not within any type of plastic bag.
- If in doubt, throw it out (in your trash bin). If you can't determine if something is recyclable, assume it
 is not. Aspirational recycling tossing it in the bin, hoping it might be recycled does more harm than
 good in advancing our recycling efforts.
