## President's Letter

Mark your calendar for the Miramonte Annual Meeting on Saturday, April 27, from 1 to 3 p.m. The meeting will be in person at the Ward 6 City Council office, 3202 E. First Street.

By now, you probably know that our longtime city councilman, Steve Kozachik, has resigned his position. Steve has worked tirelessly and has made service to his constituents his first priority. Steve was always willing to help us solve neighborhood problems and get the appropriate people at the city involved. We will miss him. The members of the MNA board have made a donation in Steve's honor to Casa Alitas, and we invite other neighbors to do likewise.

The City Council will appoint someone to the Ward 6 council seat for the rest of Steve's term. We hope to have that new council member attend the Annual Meeting and fill us in on his or her priorities, interests, etc. In addition, we will have updates during the meeting on street improvements (such as Fifth Street and the planned chicanes for Camino Miramonte) and the proposed route of the Miramonte-Palo Verde Bike Boulevard.

We expect to have officers from the Police Department available to answer our questions and provide information on addressing crime and issues related to homelessness. Finally, board elections will be held. # **Glass and Plastic Recycling**

Glass and plastic recycling continues at Ward 6. The glass is crushed, and the resulting silica sand is sold into the secondary market by the city's contractor. The city receives \$5 per ton of the glass delivered and gets 10% of the silica sand for use in city construction and roadway projects.

Plastics are processed by By Fusion into construction-grade building blocks. In the first week of 2024, more than six tons of plastics were dropped off at city collection sites and diverted from the landfill.

## **Upcoming traffic calming chicanes**

Five chicanes designed to calm traffic are expected to be installed by early summer along Camino Miramonte between 2nd Street and 5th Street. The chicanes are landscaped islands set about five feet from the curb, which are designed to narrow the roadway to slow traffic.

Two chicanes will be near the northwest and southeast corners at Hawthorne, two near the northwest and southeast corners of Edgemont, and the fifth near the northwest corner at Terra Alta.

In addition, the city plans to paint white striping about five feet from the curb on each side of the street to indicate to drivers that area is used by bicyclists and pedestrians.

Plantings will be native wildflowers, shrubs and cacti. Some planting may have to wait until cooler weather in the fall, depending on when the chicane installation occurs. Many thanks to our neighbors who live near the chicanes who will be helping to ensure that the plants get enough water in the hot months to thrive and get established.



# Rancho Center To Have New Dining, Shopping Options

Melissa Lal, president of Larsen Baker, offered an update on new retail and restaurant businesses for the Rancho Center. The real estate developer, which acquired the property in 2022, is transforming the exterior and bringing in a new locally owned restaurant, as well as the Midtown Mercantile Merchants and a Pinkberry yogurt shop.

Deborah Tenino, the creator of Contigo and Locale restaurants, will bring her culinary expertise to Rancho

Center when she opens "Miramonte" in the space that once was occupied by Cuvée World Bistro. The location most recently housed a pop-up Halloween store. Renovations to the restaurant space will include outdoor seating, using some of the current parking lot between the restaurant space and Whole Foods.

On Rancho Center's west side, next door to the new restaurant, the space previously occupied by Bookmans will have new life when the Midtown Mercantile Merchants moves its local antiques and art booths from the current location farther east on Speedway. They anticipate a soft opening April 8 and a grand reopening/8th anniversary celebration on April 13. Midtown Mercantile Merchants will house 100 booths and will be open every day from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. through April. Hours will be 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. from May through October.

In addition to the Miramonte restaurant, Lal said that a Pinkberry Frozen Yogurt shop will be opening next to Jersey Mike's Subs. Pinkberry is a national chain noted for healthy and nutritional desserts featuring fresh fruits paired with a variety of frozen yogurt flavors.

Lal is hoping the renovation and construction projects will start in late spring/early summer.



### Miramonte-Palo Verde Bike Boulevard

The final route for the voter-approved Camino Miramonte-Palo Verde Bike Boulevard is still up in the air, as of the writing of this newsletter. It appears the route will continue to follow Camino Miramonte between Speedway and 5th Street.

South of 5th Street, the city is still considering possible alternatives to the voter-approved route, which was designed to go through the El Encanto and Colonia Solana neighborhoods. Residents in those neighborhoods have expressed opposition to the route due to their narrow winding streets.

A community meeting was held on March 23 to gather input on a draft recommendation by city staff as to the final route. The staff's draft recommendation is that the original route through El Encanto and Colonia Solana be maintained.
